Thursday 15 September 2022

Beatrice Weder di Mauro is Professor of International Economics at the Graduate Institute of Geneva and Distinguished Fellow at the INSEAD Emerging Markets Institute, Singapore. Since July 2018, she serves as President of the Centre for Economic Policy Research (CEPR). From 2001 to 2018, she held the Chair of International Macroeconomics at the University of Mainz, Germany, and from 2004 to 2012 she served on the German Council of Economic Experts. She was Assistant Professor at the University of Basel and Economist at the International Monetary Fund. She held visiting positions at Harvard University, the National Bureau of Economic Research, and the United Nations University in Tokyo. She has served as consultant to governments, international organizations, and central banks (European Commission, International Monetary Fund, World Bank, European Central Bank, Deutsche Bundesbank, OECD, among others). She is an independent director on the board of Bombardier, UBS, and Bosch. She is a senior fellow at the Asian Bureau of Finance and Economics Research (ABFER), a member of the ETH Foundation, the International Advisory Board of Bocconi, and a member of the Bellagio Group. Her research addresses policy related questions in international macroeconomics.



Yuriy Gorodnichenko is Quantedge Presidential Professor of Economics at the University of California, Berkeley. As an applied macroeconomist, he works on a broad array of topics that overlap with public finance, development, international economics, and econometrics. He is the associate editor of the Journal of European Economic Association, and a visiting scholar with the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco. Gorodnichenko earned his BA and MA in economics at the National University's Kyiv-Mohyla Academy in Kyiv, Ukraine, and a PhD in economics at the University of Michigan.




Tito Boeri is full professor of economics at Bocconi University, Milan (where he had been also Dean for Research until fall 2014). He was Centennial Professor at the London School of Economics, where he is currently Senior Visiting Professor. From March 2015 to February 2019, he was President of the Italian Social Security administration. His field of research is labour economics, redistributive policies and political economics. He is Scientific Advisor of the Fondazione Rodolfo De Benedetti, where he acted as Scientific Director since its inception in 1998 to 2015. He is research fellow at CEPR, CEP-LSE, IZA, Netspar and IGIER-Bocconi. Before becoming president of INPS, he was columnist for La Repubblica and collaborated with some foreign newspapers such as Financial Times and Le Monde. He is the founder of the economic policy watchdog website www.lavoce.info, in the editorial board of www.voxeu.org, and the Scientific Director of the Festival of Economics in Trento. After obtaining his PhD in Economics from New York University, Tito Boeri was senior economist at the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) from 1987 to 1996. In this position, among other things, he coordinated all the work carried out by the OECD in the field of human resource policies in the central and eastern European economies in transition after 1990. He was also consultant to the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank, The European Commission, the International Labour Office, and the Italian Government.



Martin Kahanec is Professor and Head of the Department of Public Policy (2021-) at the Central European University (CEU) in Vienna. Martin Kahanec acted as the Dean of CEU's School of Public Policy in 2017-19 and in the academic year 2020-21; he was elected to continue as the Head of the unit when it was renamed to Department as of the academic year 2021-22. Founder and Scientific Director of CELSI, Bratislava. Mercator Senior Visiting Fellow (2019-20) at Bruegel, Brussels. Affiliated Scholar and member of the Advisory Board at the Global Labor Organization. Affiliated Researcher at Centre for Population, Development and Labour Economics (POP), MERIT, United Nations University, Maastricht; and the University of Economics in Bratislava. Research Fellow (2005-2015), Deputy Program Director "Migration" (2007-2016), and Deputy Director of Research (2009) at the Institute of Labor Economics (IZA) in Bonn, Germany. Visiting Research Fellow at Harvard University's Labor and Worklife Program 2014-15. Member of the Scientific Board of the Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs of the Czech Republic; former member of the national COVID-19 Economic Crisis Management Council at the Ministry of Finance of the Slovak Republic and member of Minister's advisory council (2020-2021). His main research interests are economic policy, labour and population economics, migration, EU mobility, ethnicity, and reforms in European labour markets.




Yegor Stadnyi is a vice rector at Kyiv School of Economics. He served as the Deputy Minister of Education and Science of Ukraine in 2019-2020. Before that, he worked at the Cedos think tank (Kyiv, Ukraine) and as a consultant for the World Bank dealing with public policy analysis in the education sphere.



Carol Propper is Professor of Economics at Imperial College London in the Department of Economics and Public Policy. Propper was made a Dame in the 2021 New Year's Honours in recognition of her public services to health and economics. Her research focuses on the impact of incentives on the quality of health care delivery and health system productivity and, more widely, on the design and consequences of incentives within the public sector and the boundary between the state and private markets. She was Associate Dean for Faculty and Research at Imperial Business School 2016-19, Co-Director and Director of the Centre for Market and Public Organisation at the University of Bristol between 1998-2009 and Co-Director of the Centre for the Analysis of Social Exclusion at London School of Economics between 1997-2007. From 2016 she has been Deputy Editor of Vox EU. She is the current President of the Royal Economic Society and a member of President Macron of France expert commission on major economic challenges. She has undertaken a wide range of public service activities including Chair of the ESRC Research Grants Board 2005-09, member of the ESRC Council 2005-09, member of the Royal Economic Society council 2000-2005. Propper was awarded a CBE for her services to social science in 2010. The accolade recognises her research into public economics and economics of health care as well as her work with colleagues from other social science and medical disciplines. She was elected as a fellow of the British Academy in 2014 and an international fellow of the National Academy of Medicine in 2018.



Yuriy Dzhygyr is a graduate of the National University "Kyiv Mohyla Academy" (1999) where he received a double bachelor degree in economy and political sciences. He continued his study at Syracuse University in the USA (Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs) where he gained a master degree in economy in 2001 with the specialization "Public Finances". In 2001-2018 Yuriy Dzhygir worked in a number of projects for international development and was responsible for the development and expert back-up of public finance reforms as well as for the funding of social sector



programs in Ukraine, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Kazakhstan, Kosovo and in the countries of Eastern Asia and Oceania. In 2015-2018 he worked as an external advisor to the Minister of Finance of Ukraine supporting the fiscal decentralisation and funding for healthcare. In 2016-2018 he worked as an external advisor to the acting Minister of Healthcare of Ukraine developing and implementing the funding reform of the healthcare sector. Yuriy Dzhygir is the Former Deputy Minister of Finance.

Gérard Roland joined the Berkeley faculty as a professor in 2001. He received his PhD from Université Libre de Bruxelles in 1988 and taught there from 1988-2001. Professor Roland is also a CEPR research fellow, where he was program director between 1995 and 2006. He serves as editor of the Journal of Comparative Economics, and was an associate editor for several other journals. Among Professor Roland's awards and honors are recipient of the Medal of the University of Helsinki, Officier de l'Ordre de Leopold II, and entry in "Who's Who in the World," "Who's Who in America," and "Who's Who in Economics since 1776." He was a fellow at the Center for Advanced Studies in Behavioral Sciences in Stanford in 1998-1999. He was program chair of the Fifth Nobel symposium in Economics devoted to the Economics of Transition in 1999. He was named Jean Monnet Professor at Université Libre de Bruxelles in 2001 and received an Honorary Professorship of Renmin University of China in 2002.



Ivan Mikloš is the former Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance of the Slovak Republic (2002-2006, 2010-2012), Deputy Prime Minister for Economy (1998-2002), and Minister of Privatization (1991-1992). He has co-founded and led the economic think tank MESA10 (1992-1998). Between 2006-2010 and 2012-2016, he was a Member of Parliament. In 2014, he was reappointed as the President of MESA10 and became a Member of the International Advisory Board of the National Reform Council of Ukraine and the platform VoxUkraine. During 2015-2016 he served as a Chief Advisor to the Minister of Finance of Ukraine and as an Advisor to the Minister of Economic Development and Trade of Ukraine. Since April 2016 until August 2019 he served as a Chief Economic Advisor to the Prime Minister of Ukraine. He is a Chairman of the Strategic Advisory Group for Support of Ukrainian Reforms and Co-Founder of the Ukrainian economic think tank Centre for Economic Strategy. Mikloš was one of the leading figures of economic transformation in the Slovak Republic. He significantly contributed to the entry of the Slovak Republic into the OECD, and instigated an extensive and effective tax reform. He led the government agenda on economic restructuring and fiscal consolidation.



Kenneth Rogoff is Maurits C. Boas Chair of International Economics at Harvard University. From 2001–2003, Rogoff served as Chief Economist at the International Monetary Fund. His widely-cited 2009 book with Carmen Reinhart, *This Time Is Different: Eight Centuries of Financial Folly*, shows the remarkable quantitative similarities across time and countries in the run-up and the aftermath of severe financial crises. Rogoff is also known for his seminal work on exchange rates and on central bank independence. Together with Maurice Obstfeld, he is co-author of *Foundations of International Macroeconomics*, a treatise that has also become a widely-used graduate text in the field worldwide. Rogoff's 2016 book "The Curse of Cash" looks at the past, present and future of currency from standardized coinage to crypto-currencies. His monthly syndicated column on global economic issues is published in over 50 countries. Rogoff is an elected member of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the Group of Thirty, and He is a senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations. Rogoff is among the top ten on RePEc's ranking of economists by scholarly citations. He is also an international grandmaster of chess.



Barry Eichengreen is the George C. Pardee and Helen N. Pardee Professor of Economics and Professor of Political Science at the University of California, Berkeley, where he has taught since 1987. He is a CEPR Research Fellow, and a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the convener of the Bellagio Group of academics and economic officials. In 1997-1998, he was Senior Policy Advisor at the International Monetary Fund. He was awarded the Economic History Association's Jonathan R.T. Hughes Prize for Excellence in Teaching in 2002 and the University of California at Berkeley Social Science Division's Distinguished Teaching Award in 2004. He is also the recipient of a doctor honoris causa from the American University in Paris. His research interests are broad-ranging, and include exchange rates and capital flows, the gold standard and the Great Depression; European economics, Asian integration and development with a focus on exchange rates and financial markets, the impact of China on the international economic and financial system, and IMF policy, past, present and future.

Oleksiy Kolezhuk received his PhD in Solid State Physics from the Institute for Metal Physics, Kyiv, Ukraine, in 1991; Dr. habil. in Physics from the University of Hannover, Germany, in 2001; and D.Sc. in Physics of Magnetism from the Institute of Magnetism, Kyiv, Ukraine, in 2004. Between 2004 and 2009, he served as the Heisenberg Fellow of the DFG, conducting research at the University of Hannover, Harvard University, and RWTH Aachen. He has been a Research Fellow at the Institute of Magnetism, National Academy of Sciences of Ukraine since 1995 and a Professor at the Institute of High Technologies, Taras Shevchenko National University of Kyiv since 2010. Kolezhuk has been a corresponding member of the National Academy of Sciences of Ukraine since 2021 and a member of the Scientific Committee of the National Council of Ukraine on Science and Technology Development since 2017, where he is also Head of the Committee since 2021.



Yulia Bezvershenko is the former Director General of Directorate for Science and Innovation at the Ministry of Education and Science in Ukraine. The Directorate was created for policy development and implementation in the research, development and innovation sector. Since the Revolution of Dignity, Bezvershenko has been deeply involved in the reform of science development and implementation process. Her mission is to build knowledge-based Ukraine as economy and society based on knowledge, science and innovation. She has contributed to the Law on Science, which was adopted by Parliament in 2015. In cooperation with scientists and reformers she developed and actively participated in the creation of two new institutions, the National Council on Science and Technology and the National Science Fund. Bezvershenko currently works both on implementation of the aforementioned law and on its future iterations. Bezvershenko holds a PhD in Theoretical Physics from the Bogolyubov Institute for Theoretical Physics (National Academy of Science of Ukraine) and a Master's degree in Public Policy and Governance from the Kyiv School of Economics. She has diverse experience in the research and development sector, having worked as a researcher at the Bogolyubov Institute as well as a senior lecturer on quantum theory at Kyiv-Mohyla Academy. Until 2019, Yulia was a Deputy Head of Young Scientists Council of National Academy of Science of Ukraine and Vice-President of NGO "Unia Scientifica" aimed to promote science and to advocate reform of science in Ukraine.



Yegor Grygorenko is a partner and a Head of the Consulting Department in Deloitte Ukraine. He leads a strong team that provides comprehensive services in strategic and operational consulting, planning and support of transformation programs, support for the implementation of complex IT products and risk management to Deloitte customers both in Ukraine and abroad. Prior to joining Deloitte, was a partner of Bain & Company, with a total of almost 15 years of consulting experience. During that time Grygorenko has launched and facilitated major turnaround programs, led strategy design projects at both the corporate and business division level, assisted clients in M&A-related projects and advised leading financial services and private equity players on governance and organization issues. Prior to that, he worked for Citigroup for seven years, doing various banking activities in Ukraine, Russia and Kazakhstan. During his time at Citi, he gained experience in a variety of areas, from risk and finance management to strategy development and business planning. Grygorenko received his MA summa cum laude from the Kyiv-Mohyla Academy (EERC/KSE) in 2001. He has several scientific publications, one of which was awarded a J. Michael Montias Prize by the Association for Comparative Economic Studies (USA). He also holds the Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) designation.



Torbjörn Becker has been Director of the Stockholm Institute of Transition Economics (SITE) at the Stockholm School of Economics since August 2006. Prior to this he worked at the International Monetary Fund (IMF) since 1997 where his most recent position was as Senior Economist in the Research Department. In this capacity, his research and policy work focused on international financial architecture issues and particularly on how emerging markets can protect themselves against adverse shocks and what role IFIs could have in preventing and resolving crises. More generally, his work covers macroeconomics, international economics, financial markets, debt management, fiscal policy and development issues. In previous positions at the IMF, he worked on emerging markets and developing countries in Eastern Europe and Russia, the Asia Pacific and the Middle East. Becker holds a PhD in economics from the Stockholm School of Economics where he also completed his undergraduate studies.



Ralph De Haas is the Director of Research at the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD) and a part-time Professor of Finance at KU Leuven. He is also a CEPR Research Fellow; a member of the CEPR's Research and Policy Network on Sustainable Finance; Fellow at the European Banking Center; Research Associate at the ZEW–Leibniz Centre for European Economic Research; and Practitioner Director at the



Financial Management Association (FMA). He completed his PhD in Economics at Utrecht University and received the 2014 Willem F. Duisenberg Fellowship Prize. His research lies at the intersection of empirical banking and development economics. He is particularly interested in firms' and households' access to financial services; the stability aspects of global banking; finance and green growth; and the role of gender in the economy.

Alexander Pivovarsky is the Director of Capital Markets Development at the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development which he joined in 2008 as a Principal Economist at the Office of the Chief Economist. He subsequently served as a Senior Adviser in the Bank's Corporate Strategy department and a Deputy Director in the Office of the President. Before his appointment to the current role, he led the EBRD's team in Belarus helping to scale up the Bank's policy dialogue efforts in the country. Prior to joining the bank, he worked at the IMF where he contributed to negotiating stabilisation programmes in countries around the world. He also led a reform advisory programme for Ukraine at the Harvard Institute for International Development. Pivovarsky holds Master's and Doctoral Degrees in Public Policy from Harvard University and a diploma from the University of Kyiv.



Volodymyr Bilotkach is an Associate Professor in Air Transport Management Program at the Singapore Institute of Technology. He joined the SIT in 2019. Previously, Dr Bilotkach taught at the the University of California, Irvine, and Newcastle University Business School in the UK. Dr Bilotkach published a book titled "Economics of Airlines", and around 40 papers in refereed journals. He is also an Associate Editor of the Journal of Air Transport Management and sits on the Editorial Board of Research in Transportation Economics. Since 2016 Dr Bilotkach has been an External Instructor with IATA Training, delivering intensive aviation policy, management, law, and planning courses around the world. Volodymyr advised the Netherlands Competition Authority; the European Commission; Incheon International Airport; and Malaysian Aviation Commission.



Tatyana Deryugina is an Associate Professor of Finance at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Her research focuses on environmental risk. She is also a co-editor at the Journal of the Association of Environmental and Resource Economists (JAERE) and at Environmental and Energy Policy and the Economy (EEPE). She also serves on the board of editors of American Economic Journal: Economic Policy (AEJ):



Policy). Deryugina is affiliated with the National Bureau of Economic Research, the Institute for the Study of Labor (IZA), the E2e Project, and the CESifo Research Network. She is currently spending most of her spare time doing what she can to help Ukraine.

Richard K. Green is the Director of the USC Lusk Center for Real Estate. He holds the Lusk Chair in Real Estate and is Professor in the USC Sol Price School of Public Policy and the Marshall School of Business. Prior to joining the USC faculty, Dr. Green spent four years as the Oliver T. Carr, Jr., Chair of Real Estate Finance at The George Washington University School of Business. He was Director of the Center for Washington Area Studies and the Center for Real Estate and Urban Studies at that institution. Dr. Green also taught real estate finance and economics courses for 12 years at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he was Wangard Faculty Scholar and Chair of Real Estate and Urban Land Economics. More recently, he was a visiting professor of real estate at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, and he continues to retain an affiliation with Wharton. Dr. Green also is a Weimer Fellow at the Homer Hoyt Institute, and a member of the faculty of the Selden Institute for Advanced Studies in Real Estate. He was recently President of the American Real Estate and Urban Economics Association.



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
